3 Quebecers, 9 guests from Europe and the Americas, and Quebec City's first art centre get together in the region's flagship cultural venue, for 4 days of intense discussion on the art of technology, a question of : Liaisons ? Expansion ?? Insurrection ???

SIGNAL brings together an internationally renowned group of artists, theorists, critics and curators to discuss the present and the future of creative practice that employs network technologies. Derrick de Kerckhove, the collaborator of Marshall McLuhan, who coined the term 'global village', revisits his vision 40 years later. Shu Lea Chang, a pioneer of an ecological vision of the Internet, presents her projects, prior to her exhibition at the Pompidou Centre. Gaia Novati, a programmer of alternative pornography, outlines her view of technology as a stage for social diversity. Gregory Chatonsky and Geoff Cox, from Montreal and Copenhagen respectively, explore the freeing potential of software development. Mike Stubbs, the director and CEO of the UK's flagship media arts centre FACT outlines the work of creative hacking.

This symposium comes at a time when wireless technology spreads imagery and data like wildfire...the economy of networked devices is booming...regulatory bodies and shareholders do all they can to maintain control...and individuals and groups from around the world consistently initiate and intervene, creating new forms of exchange, and challenging political regimes. Network technologies affect everyone's life. What to make of this fact ?
